Dear Friends:

Some of you know that a number of our saints have moved to a new address in the last few months. Their new address is Heaven. We miss them, and we look forward to seeing them again.

A great number of people are grieving a loss or are otherwise caught outside the "joy of Christmas," and the expectation that they will sing carols with gusto and love those Christmas shopping crowds is more than people ought to expect. This is one reason we are hosting our third annual Longest Night service at 7 pm on December 19. Some congregations call it a "Blue Christmas" service.

I think the root of my interest in this service can be found in my family. When I was in my late twenties and early thirties, I was invited to participate in special training in the Montana community where the church I served was located. The training would qualify me to assist high school students struggling with addiction. It fascinated me. We learned of the common patterns of addiction, particularly to alcohol and marijuana. Quickly I discovered all of us on this side of heaven are addicted to something, we hope something not too damaging, like dark chocolate. The patterns common to families with addictions (those that leave us carrying more than our fair share of anxiety, like keeping them secret and failing to welcome and accept our emotions—except for misdirected anger) were far more familiar to me than they should have been. Could my family have had addictions? But where? I asked my dad. He changed the subject. Finally a few years later, he admitted that his dad, my grandfather, who died a few months before I was born, was probably an alcoholic. I was so glad to have a good answer to my question that I forgot to pursue the story further.

One of the stories told about my grandfather was that when he was eleven and his brother was thirteen, both boys ran away from home. Then they were separated, to be reunited again twenty years later. You ask why they would leave home at such a young age. Were they hellions or ruffians? Actually their father was a school teacher and their mom probably stayed at home to raise them. The boys' dad was known to have been strict. He required them to attend Sunday worship and afterward to occupy a chair for hours at a time (and you know, this was before NFL Sunday football!). So my grandfather escaped his "good Christian home" as early as possible. Eventually as a hardworking and successful young adult, he rented a room in a home where an attractive, teenage girl lived. Since he was eleven years older than she, my grandmother required that he wait until she arrived at age eighteen before she would marry him. He waited.

The point to which I finally arrive is that for the remainder of his life he almost never attended Christian worship. The wounds he carried from his dad's extreme discipline (I haven't yet explored what he did to his sons on the other days of the week) hurt too much for forgiveness to have been shared. Yet the young girl he married was a person of deep faith (yes, she was the United Methodist I have mentioned before). If my grandfather had attended any service of worship, the Longest Night likely would have been it. A service of calm, peaceful prayers, songs, and candles with no expectations would have moved his wounded spirit. He might have been led to put down his drink and sample the natural highs of the clear-eyed and alert, the ones given freely by our loving Holy Spirit. I know I will see him some day.

Other suggestions would include ear buds, gift cards for Claire's or passes for bowling. Most of the cards we received were for \$5 - \$10 and they seemed to go over really well. Nail polish and small purses seemed to be appreciated too." Please don't wrap these gifts, but place them in the donation boxes in the church entry prior to December 16.

In addition, our congregation will "adopt a family" for Christmas. The family is one with children attending Amistad Elementary School, and we have worked with the school counselor and coordinator of Communities in Schools to determine what best to provide. We will operate this project on the gift tree principle – family member names, ages, and a gift idea will be placed on a tree for adoption. Wrapped gifts will be returned to the church by December 16 and delivered to the family just before Christmas."

This past month, we had our annual church charge conference, during which we elect officers for the upcoming year, and discuss accomplishments and what it means to us

to be members here at Kennewick First. Part of the larger report for charge conference is a summary from the church Council. I wanted to include it here for those who were unable to attend the meeting.

Last year the Church Council set goals for 2018, which were a focus during the year:

- 1. Promote sustainability in facilities, programs. and financial aspects of the church
- 2. Strengthen the connections among members, and develop/strengthen connections within the community.
- 3. Promote alternative worship offerings

What was accomplished:

- 1. The Council held a fall retreat to become better connected as a leadership team, to learn more about our spiritual gifts and where God may be calling us to serve, and wrestle with our commitment to sustainability and what that may look like for KFUMC.
- 2. We continue to learn the best way to work with our relatively new organizational structure and have shifted back to monthly meetings to provide more consistent progress and communication.
- 3. A Safety and Security Ministry team was developed. This team was started as an ad hoc team and has been approved as a permanent part of our organization. The Steward of this ministry team has a seat and a vote on the Council.
- 4. The Council has supported the Saturday Night Life service that typically meets twice monthly as an alternative worship.

Where are we headed:

The next year will bring many changes. In the forefront is saying goodbye to our

Pastor, Jerry Poole. The Council will be working closely with the Staff/Personnel Ministry Team and the Conference to transition to a new pastor.

We will continue our work on how to relate WHO we are and WHAT we're about at KFUMC to our community in an easy, relevant way. As part of our fall retreat we discussed how we describe our mission/vision to those outside our membership. Is it relatable? Here are a few ideas that came out of that conversation:

Vision: We are a Christ-centered inclusive and loving community.

Mission: We serve through our gifts.

How: We provide meaningful Youth groups, worship, congregation care, mission/service and education for both youth and adults.

As we continue to strengthen connections, learn more about our spiritual gifts-personally and communally, and look for ways to provide sustainable programs, I invite you to join us in finding solutions to ensure KFUMC is here to stay for another 116 years!


