Do Justice, Love Mercy, Walk Humbly with God*

Early on the final morning of Annual Conference I joined a group of about 60 laypersons and clergy gathered in prayer outside the Federal Detention Center in Sea-Tac, WA. I prayed for the immigrant parents inside the prison who had been separated from their children. I prayed for the children, for their safety and for healing from this trauma. I prayed for those who work in the facility and those whose employment consists of carrying out our laws, whether they agree with them or not. And, I prayed for our government, that as a nation we would find a way to honor both security and compassion. A photo was taken of me praying that morning. It's appearance on social media led to comments and questions from both those who attend church and those who don't (some who never have). Comments from UMC clergy and lay people ranged from those who strongly supported my "speaking up and speaking out!" to those who believe "politics has no place in the church."

Many of those who don't attend church approached me differently. Rather than making statements, they asked questions that led to rich conversations. "What led me to do that?" "What's the intersection for me between personal faith and public life?" "What did I hope to achieve?"

When the alarm went off at 4am that morning, I didn't want to get up. It had been a late night at the end of a long week. No one would likely notice, or care, if I didn't go. And, I rationalized; with an extra 3 hours of sleep I'd be in better shape for what I had to do that day. Getting up and going was inconvenient. Which is, in the end, why I got up and went.

For me, the practice of Christianity (aka discipleship) is about intentionally growing in my capacity to be present with God, with who I can be and become, and with other persons and the created order. If Jesus came

so that we "might have life and have it more abundantly" John 10:10, then following the way of Jesus means serving that end.

I know what it means to me when I know that others are praying for me. In addition to whatever power of the Spirit is accessed, I feel seen and accompanied. It gives me strength and courage and a sense that I'm not alone. I've been at the receiving end of others "inconveniencing" themselves for me and know its power. As I lay there in bed remembering that, getting up no longer seemed like an inconvenience. I wanted the detainees and the guards alike to experience people seeing and caring enough to change the rhythm of their day on their behalf.

I don't know the right answer to our immigration policies. As a student of the scriptures, it's clear to me that we are to be with those in difficult circumstances and work towards healing and wholeness for all people in actions of both mercy (tending to the individual's immediate needs) and justice (changing the conditions that led to that happening). In the bible, "Justice" is mentioned twice as many times as "love" or "heaven," in 1,379 separate verses by one count. It's apparently a very big deal to God. Our inner life should be connected to our outer; our private life connected with our public actions.

But, what is justice in this or any other given situation? Without knowledge, we can't know. There are many voices with many opinions. So, I'm listening to a broad spectrum of them, those I more naturally agree with and those I don't. I'm putting myself in places where I can listen to and have conversations with those personally involved new immigrants, military, fruit ranchers, politicians, human service agencies, etc. I'm pushing myself to inconvenience myself a little more often, pushing the boundaries of my comfort...and continuing to pray for us all.

May our love of God lead us to deeper and life-giving connection with our neighbor and may our life-giving connections with our neighbors lead us closer to God.

Seven-Branched Candlestick

The seven-branched candlestick represents the Holy Spirit and its seven gifts in the listing from Isaiah 11:2-3: wisdom, understanding, counsel, might, knowledge, fear of the Lord, and delight in the Lord. (By contrast, the Hanukkah menorah is a nine-branched candelabrum lit during the eight-day Jewish holiday.)
