## World Relief Mission Project for January

World Relief Tri-

Cities helps around 200 refugees yearly to get acclimated during their first couple months after being placed in the Tri-Cities. Because many of these refugees escaped from prosecution, the organization says adjusting to freedom in the United States can be challenging at first.

World Relief Tri-Cities helps with all that, from doctor's appointments to providing basic housing supplies. They also assist with employment.

So, in January, KFUMC will be collecting the following types of items to assist these refugee families:

- Lamps and lamp stands
- Forks, knives, and spoons
- Plates, bowls, and cups
- Sauce, baking, and frying pans
- Mixing/serving bowls, beverage pitchers, and Tupperware type containers
- Kitchen utensils and can openers
- Towels and wash cloths
- Sheets, blankets, comforters, and pillowcases (Linens can be new or gently used—please be sure gently used linens are washed in hot water)
- Alarm clocks
- Paper, pens, and pencils
- Waste baskets & trash bags
- Winco & Wal-Mart gift cards
- Winter coats, hats, and gloves for all ages (please, no other clothing)

A container will be placed in the entry way near the information table. We will collect throughout the month of January and deliver donations the first of February.

#### Early Response Team (ERT) Texas Trips, November 2017

Three members from Kennewick First United Methodist Church (UMC) had the honor of serving on two ERTs for Hurricane Harvey relief response in early and mid-November. Donna Parkes joined a group of volunteers from western Washington and Oregon in early November, and



Kathy and Dana Bryson followed up the next week with another 8-person team from the Northwest.

The Rio Texas conference reached out nationwide for assistance because of the huge amount of damage caused by Hurricane Harvey. The area includes numerous small, coastal communities near Corpus Christi. Thousands of homes were destroyed or damaged, and many people were, and continue to be, displaced.

The Sinton First UMC was designated as one of several "Volunteer Villages" in Texas and opened its doors to house groups of volunteers in an unused education wing. Temperatures were in the upper 80s when we arrived (yes, in November!). Two rooms had window air conditioners, so just enough to set up men's and women's dormitories. Later, more window air conditioners arrived, courtesy of UMCOR, and more rooms were made available for additional teams that continued to arrive during the week. However, the close quarters were just fine and made it possible to get to know our fellow volunteers from many places, including Colorado, Missouri, and Texas.

Our team helped three families during the first week. Kathy and Dana's team took over where we left off on the third home, finished it, and continued on to help three more families during the second week. Jobs included everything from cutting up downed trees, tarping roofs, to mucking out wet contents and building materials from inside the homes. Our mission was to make homes "safe, sanitary, and secure" and ready for the next steps.

However, we had a mission of way more importance than just providing labor. That mission was to listen to the homeowners whose whole world had been turned upside down by the storm. Beloved possessions were destroyed, and their homes, their refuge and sanctuary, became a soggy, moldy mess. Some people initially wanted the entire home's contents to be discarded. But they were able to smile when some undamaged item or an article that could be cleaned was retrieved. They shared memories about when and where they had acquired the item and what it meant to them.

Everyone who volunteered knew we were responsible for paying our own expenses. However, some of our costs were covered by donations from the PNW and OR-ID Conferences. The Christian love that was shared with a handful of families in Texas was made possible by generous gifts from many, many people. The "boots on the ground" that we provided was just the visible "tip of the iceberg" from a whole bunch of caring people.

A sincere "Thank you!" to the congregation and to the PNW and OR-ID Conferences.


During storms, emperor penguins huddle for warmth, taking turns at the center and on the perimeter of the group. While incu-
