## **Reflections on Billy Graham**

On the day I wrote this essay, I bumped into a young man in his twenties at the club where I work out. I told him I had been think-

ing this week about Billy Graham. The young weight-lifter responded, "Who's he?" I expressed surprise that the name was not familiar to him. That conversation reminded me that the millennials and I have not been reading the same books nor watching the same television.

Billy Graham was a complex character, for the most part loved and revered in American life, especially in American Christian circles. He was more critically judged by those on the progressive side, and there are some valid reasons for those assessments.

I probably first learned of Graham from his crusades on TV, which were broadcast from all over the world. I remember being unimpressed. Most television in those days was not very stirring, especially those grainy photos and film clips from around the world. Film quality had not yet arrived. Later, in May 1976 when I was in my twenties, I attended his Seattle crusade in person. (I commented on that experience in a recent Friday email article.) I went the first evening mostly out of curiosity. I expected a certain level of showmanship and kept my expectations low. In that respect, I was not surprised. However, beyond the very humanly designed program, I sensed the Holy Spirit moving. Through an ordinary message delivered by a mere human, people were hearing a powerful call to change their lives, a call to belief, a call to faith, something far more compelling than any human could produce. I was spellbound, and returned for two more evenings. Even today when I hear a clip of one of his crusade sermons, I often sense power as if it were coming from beyond him, which I believe it was.

People have criticized Graham for his connections with some of our presidents. Some have also criticized him for his unwelcoming stance on same sex attraction. This week I read an article written by someone who, many years ago, was experiencing that very attraction and felt Billy Graham's strong disapproval. How Graham's words must have wounded that young man! By then, however, Graham was a Southern Baptist, and considering that context, his beliefs were not surprising. He drank in the theology of Paul, apparently not noticing that just a few pages earlier, we read of Jesus busily healing, defending, and welcoming those on the margins, offering grace, not judgement and rejection.

One conclusion I carry with me that many parishioners may not is that preachers (hopefully) are always growing, always refining, always seeking more careful guidance from the Bible and from the Holy Spirit. My own views have shifted over the years, in some ways mellowing, in others toughening, and I think other pastors like Billy Graham experience similar shifts. I can forgive him for the theological views of his younger years. But I was not personally wounded by Graham's harsh words; if I had been, I don't expect I could have given him any slack. The stakes were too high. Not many stood with those experiencing same sex attraction back then. What they needed was exactly the same thing that each and every one of us has needed, and still need: a fresh measure of God's love and affirmation, and enough graceful warnings to keep us away from the ditch, through the preaching of Billy Graham and others.

I recommend that we take time this season to review Billy Graham's sermons and writings. Look for the power and guidance of the Spirit contained therein. Be careful, however, to distinguish between Graham's very human tendency to judge and the welcoming warmth of the Spirit. Receive the latter and leave the former.

You Should Know . . .

The books are closed on the KFUMC year of 2017. Thanks to our congregation, we finished the year in a positive financial position. The General Fund contributions of

\$464,293 exceeded the budget of \$441,671 by \$23,222. The expenses of the General Fund were \$452,194, which were under our budget of \$530,951 by \$78,758. Almost all of the underrun of the budget occurred in salaries, where we experienced staff turnover and unfilled positions compared to what was expected in the budget.

The Building, Maintenance, and Repairs (BMR) Fund received \$56,402 in contributions. The Facilities Team spent \$32,976 for replacement of a bus motor, repair of the church roof, painting the small chapel, replacing the elevator floor, grounds upkeep, security, and other maintenance expenses of our church facilities.

The results are an improved financial position for the church to help meet new opportunities and unforeseen events. Thank you all for your continued stewardship.
