And we know that for those who love God all things work together for good, for those who are called according to his purpose. Romans 8:28

Training was one of the first things that I started to look for after I was hired for the Congre-

gational Care and Outreach position. I knew I needed a training event that would better equip me to serve and care for the souls in our congregation. When I am learning a new skill, I find it's very helpful to seek wisdom from those who have experience in that specific area. It is so wonderful to surround yourself with others who feel a similar calling and to hear the stories that impacted and molded them!

My search for training led me to a 3-day Lay Servant training at the Church of the Resurrection in Kansas City, the largest United Methodist Church in the world. The training was wonderfully informative, but I was overwhelmed at how I might streamline the program to fit Kennewick First.

About that time (coincidentally? doubtful!), Tim Anderson suggested that I give this wonderful lady named Naomi McDermott a call; he felt she would be great at leading/ teaching a Bible study. I gave her a call and we met together soon after. Tim was right, Naomi is a very gifted, faith-filled lady! As we visited, I shared about the Lay Shepherd program, and she shared about her work experience and how she felt she could serve. I began to sense that many of my questions about how to structure the Kennewick 1st Lay Shepherd training would be answered through her wisdom, experience, and giving spirit. We began spending time together, going through the thick training manual that I had received from the Church of the Resurrection, adapting it to best serve our congregation. In fact, Naomi ended up contributing a great deal of time working on adapting the program into the Kennewick 1st Lay Shepherd training seminar.

For several years now, Naomi has been my right hand in the Lay Shepherd program. I have learned so much from her faith, her interpersonal relationship skills, the hospice training she has received, and her leadership skills. When God called me, the Spirit was also leading Naomi to connect alongside me in ministry. I will be forever grateful for her willing and giving heart to jump start the Lay Shepherd ministry program with me. Through the process, we have become Sisters in Christ who care deeply about each other. She and her husband Tom are Christ's disciples; they are open to the leading of the Spirit, and, as it happens, the Spirit is leading them to relocate to Boston in August. I will miss her, but I am excited to see God's work in her life and in Tom's.

Scripture is filled with leadership teams that worked together to fulfill a task or calling from God. Even Moses had his brother Aaron's assistance to help him with speaking; they were a team orchestrated by God. Ecclesiastes 4:9 & 10 speak to teamwork, "Two are better than one, because they have a good reward for their toil. For if they fall, one will lift up the other; but woe to one who is alone and falls and does not have another to help." Doing God's work together in the world strengthens the bonds of love between God's children and between God and His children. We are called to be in unity and community. If you are not already serving somehow, please pray about what God may be calling you to and who He may have in mind to come alongside you. Remember, if you say "yes," then God will equip you with everything and everyone you need to get it done! Not only have I been blessed with the partnership I have had with Naomi, but the Lay Shepherd team and congregation have as well.

On June 27, we will have an opportunity to appreciate our Lay Shepherds, introduce the newest Lay Shepherds, and honor Naomi. Please join me in praying God Speed to Tom and Naomi as they prepare to relocate.

Conference Camping Update



The Camping Board of Stewards

(CBS) met via Zoom on May 20 to review the status of our four camps moving into the summer season. Only Twinlow will be offering overnight camps this summer, and those will be capped at 50% capacity. The site advisory boards for the other three camps (Lazy F, Indianola, and Ocean Park) decided they were not in a position to do so. They are hosting day camps, family camps, and limited retreat opportunities.

The CBS received a second PPP loan of \$208,000 to assist with keeping the camps operational as we continue to cope with the impacts of COVID. This is a forgivable loan based upon how it is used (mostly staff costs and utilities) but does not begin to make up for the lost revenue of reduced or no summer camps. Looking long term, the Washington State legislature passed a bill that will move to get all 5th and/or 6th grade students into an outdoor learning experience for a week each year. A few school districts do this now, but all districts will be required to develop plans over the next couple of years. Our camps in Washington will be looking at how they might be a destination for these *Outdoor* School for All activities for some of the districts.




Anita Knight entered life eternal on May 12. Please pray that God will comfort the family and friends who will miss her dearly.


