The famous Norman Rockwell painting "Freedom from Want" depicts a typical American Thanksgiving dinner gathering of family and friends. It almost appears to be an oil painting "selfie!" The work was painted during World War II, a time of hardship for many, and the turkey, a covered silver dish, celery, pickles, and what appears to be cranberries on the table may present a much different picture than what the "very abundant" family table looks like for many today. My guess, though, is that the painter wasn't focused on what was on the table, but instead on who was at the table. What I appreciate most about this painting are the faces. All ages are represented around the table, and everyone seems to be filled with joy.

Norman Rockwell painted life as he wanted it to be, not always as it is. While many of us have experienced Thanksgiving moments that mimic the famous painting perhaps with the addition of a children's table—other Thanksgivings may not have been so idyllic.

We like to picture the first Thanksgiving with the Native Americans and the Pilgrims sitting down together with the same joy and ease that Rockwell captures in the painting, but I'm sure it was quite different than that. Of the original 102 colonists who sailed on the Mayflower, only 53 survived the first winter (of that number, only 4 were adult women) to celebrate the harvest in the autumn of 1621. The previous year was a time that included loss and grief (and maybe even homesickness) for the colonists. Nevertheless, they gathered at harvest-time for feasting and recreational activities . . . with approximately 90 Native Americans from the Wampanoag tribe. We don't know exactly how these two groups came together, but we understand that they

shared meals and games for three days! There was likely some tension in both groups as a result of communication and cultural differences, but I am confident that everyone gave thanks to creator God for all that they had, in their own way and in their own language.

When we gather at table, whether at home or at church, we come with expectations. We have a vision of what we want and need, but each gathering is unique based on who is and is not present, as well as other life circumstances. Just like the first harvest feast, this year we may find people missing from our Thanksgiving table because of death or other circumstances, there may have been illnesses over the course of the year that will affect our usual customs, or there may be tension between family members or friends. Communication in families may be difficult this year. But like those who celebrated that first fall harvest, we will again gather to give thanks to God, appreciate our blessings, and welcome new faces in our midst . . . and, like those depicted in the Norman Rockwell painting, we will seek to find joy, have hope, and enjoy differences. We will give thanks to God for what we have, for what we have is from the Lord and what He has given us is more than enough, and is, in fact, often more than enough to share with others.

May this Thanksgiving be a time of appreciation, invitation, sharing, hope, celebration, and joy!

We don't use all the donated bread and desserts from Panera each week, so a good deal of that is taken by the guests. The Kamiakin High School Key Club is again preparing and serving dinner on the 3rd Thursday of each month.
