World Relief Collection

In previous Januarys, this congregation has collected needed items for World Relief and

Refugee Assistance will do so again this year. The agency has been mostly shut down for the past 2 years with no refugees entering the country. But in the last two months of 2021, the agency received 52 refugees. For 2022, they are expecting 70 Afghans and 220 other refugees. The agency has put a plea out to the community for items needed to re-settle the families in the Tri-Cities.

There are some items that would be difficult to collect at the church (e.g., dining tables), but there are many items which church members can bring to the welcome area or to the church office. The requested items include:

- pots and pans
- * baking dishes and silverware
- * kitchen utensils and knives
- * brooms and dustpans
- * large wastebaskets
- shower curtains and rings
- kids' toys, baby dolls, Barbies, cars, and Legos
- * sheets (mostly twin), blankets (queen or twin), and comforters (queen or twin)
- * towels
- * laundry and cleaning supplies
- * diapers
- * gift cards to Winco or Walmart
- men's and women's winter coats and gloves for men

Starting in January, there will be a large box available in the welcome area in which to deposit your donations, or, if you are not attending church in person, please take them to the church office. Let's all support this important mission for World Relief.

When Ida Nelson, head tribal clerk of a remote Alaskan village, heard an airplane flying low after dark, she knew something was wrong. Igiugig (Igggy-yaw-gigg), population 70, isn't normally a nighttime destination. Indeed, the medevac flight was coming to pick up a sick child.

Because the local airstrip's lights had been vandalized, the plane was having trouble landing. Nelson began alerting neighbors, and within minutes, villagers lined the runway with their vehicles, headlights blazing. The pilot was able to land and then safely deliver the sick child to an Anchorage hospital. The airlift service praised the residents' determination, but Nelson describes their effort as "normal" and "ordinary."

What everyday actions can you use to provide light amid darkness? How can you shine Jesus' light in a world that needs him?

Chaos to Confidence or Wandering Leads to Wisdom

During Christmas, I had the opportunity to put puzzles together with my 2-year-old granddaughter. One puzzle design was the Peppa Pig cartoon and one was of the Disney Princess Aurora. Each of these puzzles contained just 24 pieces. I set the box upright so that she could see the picture while we were putting the puzzle together. We first turned all the pieces with the design face up and picked out the four corner pieces . . . so far, so good. I then explained that the pieces with straight edges were the side pieces, and we referred to the picture to help set them in place to look like a picture frame . . . still going well! Next we began to fill in the inside of the picture frame that we had assembled, and here is where things began to get complicated! Up until this point, she had some good reference points and more order, but now all the pieces appeared to be the same shape with similar colors stamped on them. Frustration began to set in, and this once simple game was now an overwhelming challenge. Once again, I helped her to break it down into simple steps, making a few small connections that could connect to the frame, which would eventually complete the picture!

When the first puzzle was complete and it looked just like the picture on the box, she was thrilled!! We had mastered it!! But, would she be up for the second one? I was a bit reluctant to ask, "Blake Olivia, do you want to put the princess puzzle together now?" but to my surprise, her response was an excited "yes"! We set about putting the second puzzle together just as we did the first one. She remembered with confidence about the corner and straight-edged pieces and didn't seem as concerned about the

many middle pieces and began matching the colors and pictures together with ease. The princess puzzle went together much faster and with much more enthusiasm than the first one.

There is such wisdom in the "been there done that" moments in our life. I bet there are very few people who enjoy uncomfortable, challenging, or the steep learning curve moments in life, but it is in conquering, stepping into, or trying that we grow in knowledge, wisdom, and confidence. We can be encouraged by remembering that Jesus equips as we are called, often providing mentors to help, and He Himself, who has promised never to leave or forsake us, will bring comfort and stability to a shaky learning moment.

As we enter a new year and begin to challenge ourselves with a fresh list of resolutions, may we remember to take them one at a time, break things down into small steps, and don't get so overwhelmed that we decide to give up. The Wise Men followed a Star for many months before they found what we, too, search for . . . the Messiah, the Savior of the world, the love that came at Christmas . . . Jesus Christ. Just because we don't read of the times the Wise Men were lost, low on water or food, in danger, or sick doesn't mean that they didn't experience these hardships, but I believe that the outcome far outweighed the challenge. Just so, this can also be true for each
