

Soul Soup

Despite the rising number of cases and infection rates of the Omicron variant of COVID 19 virus, Soul Soup has continued to serve 25 to 40 guests each week. We



are providing masks as needed, including N95 masks (a gift from Lynnaie Wright). We practice the same COVID protocols at Soul Soup as we do in our worship services (masking, social distancing, sanitizing).

Gloves, socks, hats, bedrolls, and blankets continue to be in demand along with a good meal. We have benefited from donations of canned and prepackaged foods for distribution along with our weekly supply of fresh bread products from Panera.

Please keep our guests and volunteers in your prayers as we all attempt to avoid exposure to the virus and its consequences.

World Relief Donations

We would like to thank

everyone who responded to the call for World Relief donations as the agency welcomes Afghanistan (and other) refugees to the area. During the month of January, we posted needs of the agency to which you responded with donations of gift cards, cash, sheets, blankets, towels, cleaning supplies, and more. World Relief is very grateful to our church and other area churches that are providing what is needed to re-settle the large numbers of refugees coming to the Tri-Cities. In the October 2020 through September 2021 year, World Relief received only a small number of refugees compared to what they will receive in the October 2021 through September 2022 time period.

Here is the response from the director of World Relief when asked about where the agency is in terms of refugee numbers:

"By the end of January we will have received 71 Afghans, all of whom were forced to flee last August when the Taliban took control of their country. Welcoming all these people has been a stretch for our office, since we'd only received 28 refugees during the prior year. However, along with these Afghans we've welcomed an additional 49 refugees from Ukraine, Sudan, Syria, El Salvador, and Burma. All in the past 4 months. We are expecting to see roughly 20-25 people coming every month through the end of the year. We are still suffering through some growing pains, but none of this could be accomplished without your support and the support of other churches and organizations here in the Tri Cities."

Again, thanks to all who were able to help with this important mission effort.

On a Friday morning during Advent, our small group gathered at Marti Meyers' home to continue our Adam Hamilton study on God's faithfulness to Joseph, Jesus' earthly father. Hot tea in hand, chocolates on side tables, and with a fire to warm us, our cozy get-together was completed by Marti's extremely rambunctious puppy, Jewel, who is always thrilled to see us! Suddenly, we became aware of a sound that halted our conversation and ultimately ended all thoughts of Bible learning for the day. It was a crashing sound from down the hall, perhaps like a picture falling.

Marti got up from her chair and went to investigate. The remaining three of us were still, listening, until we heard Marti scream. .. "WATER, IT'S SPRAYING EVERY-WHERE!" Kathy, Peggy, and I ran to investigate and found Marti, hair already soaking wet, searching for a way to turn off the water that was springing forth. The valve to the toilet was elusive, and we tried turning the water off at the sink . . . which we thought might be the issue based on the trajectory of the geyser, but that didn't stop it. Water was spraying the walls and flooding out into the hall into the carpet. I raced outside, running around the yard with Kathy trying to find the main shut off valve. Peggy was inside, soaking wet along with Marti, trying to mop up water with towels and emptying the water-filled bathroom drawers. All the while, water continued to spray!! I finally found a shut off valve in the garage near the water softener. . .and after turning the lever, the indoor flooding ceased. In the meantime, Marti had called a plumber, and we located a shop vac in the garage, which Peggy used to soak up the water from the carpet and linoleum. Kathy called Shorty, who brought us a second shop vac to fortify our efforts, I located a couple of fans to begin drying the carpet, and Kathy continued to mop up!

Oh, and in case you think I've forgotten her, at some point in this madcap adventure,

we had needed to catch Jewel, and to her dismay, banish her to the back yard!

Make jars of Italian barley soup to share love and warmth with friends.



- · 1 cup pearled barley
- ½ cup sundried tomatoes
- 1 Tbsp dry minced garlic
- 1 Tbsp dry minced onion
- 1 veggie bouillon cube
- Glass pint jars with lids
- Cardstock
- Scissors
- Pen.

What you do:

- In order, layer the first five ingredients into the jar.
- Trace the outline of the lid onto cardstock. Cut out.
- On the card, write these directions: Remove wrapper from bouillon cube. Add contents of jar to saucepan. Add 4 cups water and a can of diced tomatoes. Bring to a boil over high heat, reduce to low. Simmer about 20 minutes, until barley is tender. Serve with parmesan cheese.
- Place the card atop the lid. Screw on the canning ring to keep it in place.
