Whether you are widowed, divorced, or have always been single, we would like to invite you to gather with other Seniors from your church to share life's joys and concerns and your faith. The group will meet weekly and informally at the Roxy Antique Coffee Shop, called Rockabilly Roasting, where you can purchase a cup of coffee or the like. During the first meeting you will get to come up with a name for the group that may fit better than the generic one that is the title of this write up. May this be a place where friends gather to lend encouragement, laugh, and share stories with each other. When Soul Soup started, our goal was to simply provide a warm meal for homeless people. Later, we discovered that in the



hour plus that the meal was served, it was a time of safety and fellowship for our guests. As time went on, Soul Soup volunteers learned names, heard some life stories, and began to develop friendships with our guests and with one another.

In spite of our prayers to the contrary, most of us had a hard time believing that we would see many successes/turnarounds in the lives of our guests. Too often, some would come completely wiped out on drugs or in some mental health emergency. Some would be absent for long periods because they were in jail. Several died.

Then we noticed that one of the women who attended regularly but was frequently in a chaotic condition became noticeably absent. Months went by before we saw her again. We learned that she had gone to rehab and had been released to a halfway house. She showed up and was excited to let us know that she was clean and intended to stay that way, only through prayer . . . hers and ours. While we celebrated her victory, there remained a shadow of doubt that her sobriety would last, long term.

However, "D" now works for a non-profit that helps the homeless find housing and other essential services. She comes to Soul Soup occasionally now, not for a meal, but to socialize and catch up with the guests and Soul Soup volunteers and to help those guests in any way she can. We continue to be overwhelmingly blessed and have come to better understand that Soul Soup is God's ministry among His people and that His grace and mercy abound.

United Methodist Women Change Name, Expand Goals

UMW, serving across the world, is renamed! Our Kennewick First unit is now part of **United Women of Faith**, which is open to all women who share a devotion to missions, as outlined by Jesus.

The desire of UWF is to bring forth an array of new and improved programs that nurture current and new members, and advance love and services to women, children, and youth who face tough challenges.

A fresh website explains all the aspirations and changes which will be rolled out this year. There will also be a new All-Access National Membership, enabling women to join United Women in Faith via the website and participate online or in person at units such as ours.

UWF's first emergency grant of \$10,000 will support women activists in Ukraine. The grant will go to the organization's longtime partner in Kyiv to aid activists who plan to remain in their residences during the war and provide food, water, medicine, and other basic necessities to women and children living in bomb shelters.

If you want to take part in the many missions of United Women in Faith, come to our Wednesday, April 27, meeting at 10 am in the Susanna Wesley Room.

Eddie Kenoyer will lead a discussion on racial justice and how we can work to expand it. Joy Circle will be hostess. For the sharing gift we are invited to bring Fruit Loops and Oreos for My Friend's Place. Nancy Russell announced that the nonprofit also would welcome cleaning supplies.

At the March unit meeting, Phyllis Koschik passed out a list of items needed for relief in Ukraine. Items should be taken to the sheriff's office at 7122 W. Okanogan Place. The list includes gauze bandages and new black winter socks, hats, and gloves.

Our program welcoming Spring was all about the sweetest-smelling building in Pasco, the home of Grace Kitchen! This marvelous non-profit assists marginalized women in our community with job training, friendship, education, and discipleship.

The Grace Kitchen director, Amada Lorraine, explained that their expanding, popular services and food products are available at 112 N Second Avenue in Pasco. On the Internet site -- Grace.Kitchen -- Pasta Mama and other products are displayed, and the Kitchen's work is explained. Our UWF members support the mission and hope to take a tour of their facilities soon.

Micki Perry reviewed the 150 years of compassionate work by UMW and how the Legacy Fund will help our new UWF to expand.

Pat Walker encouraged members to try a book from the UWF bookcase in the church library. She recommended two new volumes, <u>Gum Moon</u> and <u>She Came To Slay</u>, the Life and Times of Harriet Tubman.

Phyllis closed the meeting with a sincere suggestion: Pray for peace, Place a sun-flower in your window.

Where is your Garden of Gethsemane ?

I find celebrating the resurrection of Jesus on Easter Sunday much more meaningful if I have spent time during Lent focusing on the journey Jesus made to the cross. We miss so much if we skip right from shouts of *Hosanna*! on Palm Sunday . . . "Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord" . . . to the Easter Sunday shouts and songs of praise . . . "Christ Is Risen!" In the days between those glorious Sundays, Jesus experienced many of His most meaningful moments with His friends, family, and God, revealing to us much about our Savior.

This year, I have thought a lot about Jesus' significant time of prayer in the garden of Gethsemane prior to His arrest. An account of this time of prayer is included in each of the four gospels, and these scriptures help us to better understand both the humanity and divinity of Jesus Christ. On the evening that Jesus and His disciples celebrated the Passover meal in the Upper Room, Jesus tried to give them some insight into the gravity of the moment in His words and actions. He spoke to the Twelve of the Holy Spirit, of the treatment they could expect in the coming days as His disciples, and He prayed for them and for Himself. He washed their feet to show them how they were to serve others and broke bread with them, equating it with the coming breaking of His body. Then Jesus led them to the Garden of Gethsemane, a familiar, quiet place, a special place to pray. Jesus was in great agony and under immense stress, and He asked Peter, James, and John to stay awake to "watch with Him and pray." They and the others couldn't fully know the depth of Jesus' anguish, and Jesus had to wake them several times, as they struggled to stay awake. During this time of prayer, Jesus wrestled between asking

God to remove the cup of wrath from Him, showing His humanity, and submitting to His Father's will ("yet not what I want but what You want") revealing His divinity. Scripture tells us that He was "exceedingly sorrowful unto death," but God sent an angel to strengthen Him. Jesus was praying so hard that His sweat became like great drops of blood falling to the ground (there is a medical explanation for this).

All of us can probably relate to the feelings of fear and anxiety that lead to mental anguish, even if it isn't to the extent Jesus experienced. We are also likely familiar with our need to have people support us and pray for us. Many of us live our lives hoping we are acting in God's will, but few of us will be required to sacrifice our physical life in obedience to God.

But though my experience does not touch what Jesus endured, His time of prayer on that evening provides me with a few reminders and examples to follow:

- It is good to find a special or quiet place, where I can quiet my heart to meet with God
- Like Jesus, I should also be asking others to join me in prayer
- God understands that I may struggle, and does not hold that against me
- God is eager to strengthen me
- I should speak less and listen more
- The Lord wants to spend time with me
- The Lord answers prayer

God is about reuniting people to Himself and will strengthen us as we build His Kingdom. He reminds us that we are not alone, and that a community that lends prayer and support is a Good Thing. May we continue to be a church that prays for God's Kingdom to come, "Thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven."




Godspeed Big Bus
