

I have always wondered how people just disappear, but it happens. Often an adult child who resides in another area will relocate their parent(s) to their area to be closer to them to better provide for their care. Unfortunately, the adult children sometimes forget to let the church office know or provide a forwarding address and phone number to contact them. My heart is always broken when I have exhausted all resources to locate one of our "lost" to us parishioners. Please know how much you are loved and cared for, you are not just a name in a church directory. Here are some ways that you can help your church care for you:

- ▼ Send prayer or visit requests to office@kennewickfirst.com or call the church office at 509-582-2163 so that we can be in contact with you.
- If you are relocating, please let the church office know.
- You are welcome to leave one of your children's phone numbers with the office or staff so that we can keep up with you if a medical issue or relocation should arise.

 Alert one of your friends at church to what is going on so that they can be praying for you.

The parable of the lost sheep comes to mind each time I (or we) begin searching for a parishioner. Just like Jesus, we have a strong love and bond with our Kennewick First family and care deeply. So many members of our community do a great job of connecting, contacting, and communicating with each other, but if you are someone that feels a bit outside the flock, please let us know so that we can help to bring you back into the fold. After all it can be a bit scary to be lost, and scary to be searching for the missing. It's always better when we are celebrating the great shepherd together!
