After the Storm

Wednesday, September 28, 2022, was a day of constant prayer for me. Many of my friends and family members, including my

church family, were also in prayer for my son Brian and daughter in law Amelia, who live in Cape Coral, Florida, and work in Fort Meyers. My long prayer vigil was prompted by Hurricane Ian, which hit the gulf coast of Florida that day. Less than a year after my adult children moved to Florida, they would experience a near Category 5 hurricane that hovered over their new home for over 8 hours.

I had often prayed that their first hurricane would be a small Category 2 so that they could "practice" and get a feel for what to expect. Both Brian and Amelia celebrate birthdays in June, so months earlier I sent . . . well, Amazon delivered their emergency preparedness birthday gifts! From across the United States, I felt the "eye roll." We sent them several emergency lights that are either solar, battery, or crank operated, along with an emergency AM/FM weather radio, solar cell phone charger, and LED flashlight. As parents, we just wanted to send them a gift that we knew would be helpful and practical, just in case. Little did we know that only 90 days later, those gifts that caused the eyes to roll would become such valuable and useful items!

During the hurricane we had limited communication, often hours would go by between texts that would let us know they were still doing well. We received a phone call from them at about 8 PM, their time, letting us know that not only were they ok, but the house was still standing. They didn't have power, and wouldn't for the next 10 days, but they were thrilled that all was mostly good. They next day they got up and began picking up the pieces in the neighborhood. Brian helped neighbors put blue tarps on their roofs and one on his own as well, they searched for pieces of their fence (and found most of it) and helped neighbors clean up debris and relocate items. They hooked up the generator and learned to "make do" with what they could—Amelia learned she could make eggs in a waffle iron! While they did have minor roof damage and some sheetrock and fence damage, they fared well and they were thankful.

In the aftermath, they have helped friends and the community, where needed. Brian has sent many videos of the area; sadly some of the places he had taken us when we visited are gone or badly damaged. He has been saying all along, "Mom, you guys need to bring a mission team here, there is so much work to do," and recently, I began to think he was right . . . and so we are! Like Mr. Rogers always used to say, "look for the helpers," and as people of Christ, we are called to help our neighbors. So, this year a small group of Sr UMYers are going to Fort Meyers, Florida, to help neighbors that they haven't yet met.

Storms cause damage, but storms also give opportunity to show God's love. Please pray for the Sr UMY and their leaders as they raise funds to help repair and rebuild homes from June 15 to June 24 this year.

DID YOU KNOW.....

.....that the United Methodist Church has over 12 million members worldwide? The early beginnings of Methodism started back in 1736 when brothers John and Charles Wesley came to the New World to spread the movement they began as students in England. The UMC was created in 1968 when The Evangelical United Brethren Church and The Methodist Church united to form a new denomination. The UMC does not have a central headquarters or a single executive leader. Duties are divided up among three main bodies: The General Conference, The Council of Bishops, and The Judicial Council.

The General Conference, which meets every four years, is the legislative body that sets official policy and speaks as the entire denomination. It has the power to revise The Book of Discipline and The Book of Resolutions. It can also make amendments to the denomination's Constitution. The General Conference also approves the budget allocating apportioned funds, approves the UM Hymnal and The Book of Worship, and approves the official teachings such as Baptism and Holy Communion.

The Council of Bishops is comprised of all bishops, both active and retired, and is charged with the general oversight and promotion of the temporal and spiritual interest of the entire Church. It provides guidance in carrying out the Church's mission. This council meets twice a year. Each bishop is specifically assigned to preside over the work of a regional area. In the UMC, the Office of Bishop is filled by ordained clergy members who are consecrated for their role as Bishop of the church. They are elected at Jurisdictional Conferences held every four years, and each serves a four-year term. All bishops attend the General Conference.

The Judicial Council is the denomination's highest judicial body and consists of nine members. It is made up of four clergy and four laity, with the ninth seat alternating between the clergy and laity. Members are elected by the General Conference, with the nominees being submitted by The Council of Bishops. Each member serves a term of eight years and can serve two successive terms. This council meets twice a year to consider whether actions of the various church bodies adhere to the constitution and are following the rules outlined in The Book of Discipline.

Q & A from your Lay Leader

Following are four questions that have come to my attention:

Q: Where are our buses? I have not seen them parked behind church.

A: We have sold the big bus, as repairs needed far outweighed its value. The other buses have been parked off -campus to minimize the threat of theft or vandalism.

Q: What are the exposed PVC pipes that are in the back of the church?

A: This is a temporary repair of our ongoing plumbing issues.

Q: When will we be able to host a Walk with Christ again?

A: Due to the major plumbing repairs that still need to be made, we are unable to host large events that will put too much demand on our current plumbing system.

Q: When will the major plumbing repairs be done?

A: Due to the extremely high cost of the repairs, the sewer/plumbing repairs would best take place in conjunction with some other projects, so that expensive excavating and ground work would not have to be done twice. When those projects are ready, we will address them in a bundle.

Geographical regions in Africa, Europe, and the Philippines are divided up into Central Conferences. The United States is divided up into five geographical areas called Jurisdictions. Our State of Washington is in the Western Jurisdiction. In our Western Jurisdiction, there are seven Annual Conferences. Three of these Annual Conferences, (Alaska Conference, Oregon/Idaho Conference, and Pacific Northwest Conference) are part of The Greater Northwest Area. The Greater Northwest Area is led by Bishop Cedrick Bridgeforth. Our Annual Conference is the Pacific Northwest Conference. Within our PNWC are five districts that include over 250 churches in Washington, the Idaho Panhandle, and the greater Vancouver, B.C. area. Our district is the Seven Rivers District, which includes 32 churches in Washington and is led by District Superintendent Rev. Daniel Miranda.

The denomination's website, <u>www.umc.org</u>, is filled with helpful information and resources if you want to learn more.
