The Fall of Big Blue

My Grandpa Boice couldn't have known when he purchased a little potted Blue

Spruce in December of 1990 for his and my Grandma's Christmas tree that it would be his last. After Christmas, in January, he gave the little Blue Spruce Christmas tree to Jocelyn, who was only 3 at the time. His desire was for the tree to be planted in the yard of the home that we had moved into the previous July. In the spring, Brian and Jocelyn decided on the planting spot, Randy dug the hole, and into the ground the little tree went. Their Great Grandpa Boice saw it planted in the yard prior to his drowning several months later in July when he was 80 years old.

During wind storms over the years, we have lost trees and large limbs have fallen, but Big Blue just swayed back and forth, always bending, never breaking. Then, after standing in our yard for over 32 years, Big Blue, who was over 47 feet tall, fell in the last windstorm. A great sadness fell over our family as the great majestic tree laid across the yard and the space it had once filled stood empty. Big Blue went down perfectly without harming anything, and that is a miracle. The tree had been home to many quail families, squirrels, made great shade for the "prayhouse," and provided the backdrop for our family photos.

We'll plant a new tree in the empty space left by Big Blue, but it won't have the same meaning as Big Blue and will take years to "grow up." I feel the same way when I lose significant people in my life. The emptiness in the space they once filled and their wisdom cannot really be replaced. It takes years to grow up and begin to provide something useful for another. I have been told that "everyone is replaceable" and at one point I may have even believed it, but it isn't true. Jobs or tasks can be done by another person, but because of the specific gifts or talents a person may possess, the task will be accomplished differently.

I have witnessed many of our church and family members go on to life triumphant, and the visions or areas of responsibility they once had went with them. But, like the empty space left by my old Blue Spruce, the empty spaces left by those who have joined the Church Triumphant become open spots for new growth. The new tree we plant in Big Blue's spot will not provide the same shade or quail hideout for many years, but it will grow and will bring its own joys to us. Just so, I can encourage others as Donna Troxel and Jacque Sonderman did for me, but I will do it in my own way, because I am not Donna Troxel or Jacque Sondeman; their gifts were uniquely theirs, just as mine are unique to me.

Let's be encouraged as we move forward in the Lenten season to remember that a tree had to fall so that Jesus could give His life, and in doing so, a spot was cleared for our new life. He was nailed on a cross, an old dead tree, and on that cross, He pointed us straight to heaven. That dark day on Calvary, it may have looked to the disciples like His going left a great empty space that would stay a hole forever, but He sent the Holy Spirit to fill that empty space! May we use our wisdom on this earth to share His love with others in our own way using the gifts provided to us from the Holy Spirit. You are not replaceable; the space you fill is valuable, you are a one and only, and the Lord is counting on you to stand up for the One who gave you life, until the great windstorm of heaven brings you down, and your work here on this earth is done and the Carpenter takes you home.

He himself bore ours sins in his body on the tree, that we might die to sin and live to righteousness. By his wounds you have been healed. 1 Peter 2:24

DID YOU KNOW.....

... that our church changed its method of governance in April 2017? We changed to a simplified single-board governance in hopes of simplifying decision-making and making it easier for projects and programs to be approved. Our church is now led by a Leadership Council (instead of an Administrative Council).

This Council is responsible to discern and articulate the mission, vision, values, and boundaries for the church and congregation. This Council looks at "who we are," "how we function," and "what God is calling us to." This council focuses on the resources of the congregation to direct them toward the mission. It ensures that the other ministry teams have the tools and resources they need to carry out their duties.

When the change was made six years ago, it was recommended that this Leadership Council consist of at least six and no more than 15 members, and that it meet infrequently, only three to six meetings per year, up to four hours in length. (Presently the Leadership Council meets for quarterly scheduled meeting.) The simple governance model is meant to be flexible and to change as the church changes over time. Originally the council included a Chair, the Pastor, the Lay Leader, people with finance and facilities skills, people with skills in employment practices, and people representing the age, gender, and cultural diversity of the congregation. Members serve a three- to four-year term. As the Council has evolved over the last 6 years, the focus has been on nominating individuals to serve on the Council who display spiritual leadership within the congregation and inviting individuals to consult with the team on specific areas as the need arises. This allows the Council to focus on larger, longterm and "big picture" issues and discernment of the direction of the church, rather than being emmeshed in the day-to-day operations of individual ministries.

Current members serving on the Leadership Council are: Cory Manley, Chair, Pastor Mark McMurray, Audrey Manley, Jim Deatherage, Rich Nelson, and Dana and Kathy Bryson. We have recently had four members complete their term.

In addition to the Leadership Council, our church is guided by teams that do administrative and programing ministries. These include: Finance Ministry Team, SPMT (Staff Parish Ministry Team), Facilities Ministry Team,

Youth Ministry, Children's Ministry, Choirs and Music Ministry, United Women of Faith, and the Security Ministry Team, as well as other unique teams that organize and produce programs such as Soul Soup and other projects, including short-term projects.

As Lay Leader, I am automatically an "at large" member of these ministry groups. Having a strong background in business and finance, I am currently a member of the Finance Ministry Team. So let's start with this ministry.

The Finance Ministry overseas the financial expenditures and revenues of the church.

The Finance Ministry Team:

- works with all our church ministry teams on what their financial budget needs are
- works with the church bookkeeper monitoring actual vs budgeted expenditures and revenues
- assures financial computer systems operate appropriately
- audits prior years' financial records
- prepares the all-church budget, as well as individual ministry budgets
- invests financial reserves as needed
- monitors church personal property inventory
- assures property insurance is appropriate
- prepares the financial portion of the annual report to the Conference.

The members of this ministry team are: Rich Nelson, Chair, Cory Manley, Audrey Manley, Roberta Barcot, Jane Hunt, Carol Kerkow, Sharon Varzendah, Alex Amegashie, Loretta Curley, Scott Woodside, and George Block.

With Rich Nelson's educational and employment experience in finance and administration, he makes an efficient and effective chair for this ministry.

I plan to feature the remainder of the ministry teams in future Clarion issues.

Q & A from your Lay Leader

<u>What is the difference between a Lay Member to Annual Conference, Lay Leader, and Lay</u> <u>Shepherd?</u>

By definition in the UMC Guidelines:

The Lay Leader

- functions as the primary representative of the laity in that local church;
- fosters awareness of the role of the laity within the congregation and through their ministries in the home, workplace, community, and world; and finds ways within the community of faith to recognize those ministries;
- meets regularly with the pastor to discuss the state of the church and the needs for ministry;
- serves as a member of the charge conference, church council, the committee on finance, the committee on nominations and leadership development, and the committee on staff/pastor-parish relations;
- continues to be involved in study and training opportunities to develop a growing understanding of the church's reason for existence and the types of ministry that will most effectively fulfill the church's mission;
- assists in advising the church council of community needs and opportunities for more effective ministry in the community;
- informs the laity of training opportunities provided by the annual conference;
- attends training opportunities in order to strengthen his or her work;
- is urged to become a certified lay servant.

Lay Member of the Annual Conference

The lay member of annual conference, along with the pastor, interprets the work done by the annual conference session (which meets annually each June) to the congregation. They are the liaisons between the congregation and the general church and represent the congregation in the actions taken at the annual conference sessions. The lay member of annual conference

- participates in the annual conference sessions and votes on all matters except those pertaining to ministerial relations;
- reports to the congregation and to the church council as soon as possible, but not later than three months after the close of the conference;
- serves as a member of the charge conference, church council, the finance committee, and the staff/pastor-parish relations committee.

Lay Shepherds

Lay Shepherds are members of a congregation who offer and coordinate care-giving for those who have special needs within our congregation and neighborhoods. Lay Shepherds work closely with the Pastoral staff and provide support to families in times of crisis.
