
May 21 is the last day of Sunday School for children

Sr UMY Mission Trip to the Sunshine State

On Thursday, June 15, at 5 PM, the Sr UMYers who signed up to go on the mission trip, along with four adult leaders, will load up a church bus, gather for prayer, bid their families farewell, and depart for Seattle. The

group will fly from Seattle to Ft. Myers, Florida, the next day, where they will serve the Harlem Heights neighborhood, rebuilding homes that were damaged during Hurricane Ian on September 28, 2022. Some of the projects they will be doing include demolition, framing, installing sheet rock, mudding and texturing, and anything else that needs to be done to help a family get back into their home. Over 300 homes need refurbishing, and to date, just 35 families have moved back into their homes; we hope to help several more as we serve June 17-23. We fly back to Seattle on June 24 and will drive back to the church the same day, arriving at about 5 PM. We are grateful for the funds that have come in from so many of you to help, and we hope to represent you and the Lord well as we respond to this invitation. Please continue to keep the team in prayer as we prepare: Teens, Angelica, Scott, Tim, Joe, Max, James, and Ellie; leaders, Cynthia, Sierra, Dick, and Dave.

A very special **THANK YOU** goes out to two people who put in an enormous amount of time and effort this year to ensure that our



youth were able to engage and flourish in our UMY programs. Cynthia, our Congregational Care Coordinator, and Starlite, our Sunday School Superintendent, have tirelessly planned and participated in/led weekly UMY activities and youth retreats, including the Twinlow Spring Retreat and the Jr and Sr Ski Days. They worked with the UMY leaders so that they were equipped to fulfill their leadership roles as well. Every activity was not only fun, but also furthered the spiritual growth of each of our youth.

Cynthia planned and will lead the summer Sr High Mission trip. She also planned a great deal of the summer Middler trip before turning it over to Claressa, our new Youth and Education Director. Starlite led the Jr Ski day and plans to go on the Middler trip where she will be available to assist Claressa as she leads Middler for the first time.

COMMUNITY OUTREACH

Our church is known for doing things in our community, especially for helping East Kennewick. On Saturday, April 22, our Spiritual Leadership Council met for our 2nd quarter meeting. Our church had set aside \$15,000 to be given to a worthy cause in our community. Three possible organizations were discussed: 1) B5 Family Learning Center, which helps assimilate immigrants and refugees into our community; 2) Chaplaincy Services Network, which helps community members recover from traumatic events, such as losing everything in a fire; and 3) Hillspring Church purchase of a nearby building, with hopes of turning it into a community center for those in need. The Council voted to donate 50% to B5 and 50% to Chaplaincy Services Network. Hillspring will be considered in the future when they are closer to final plans for the building. We are so excited that our church can help make a difference in so many lives in our community.



The Mess Tent

From Cynthia

I was not in the military, so what I have learned about mess tents has been from others who served or from watching the TV show M*A*S*H. The term "mess tent" generally refers to a gathering place, sometimes portable, designed to shelter persons in a group setting (such as the military or camp) when they eat. We know that tents have historically had great significance, most especially during the Exodus, as a place where the people of God interacted with God at the "Tent of Meeting." Originally the Tent of Meeting was set outside the city (Exodus), but later was erected in the middle of the city (Numbers), becoming the heart or center of the community revealing God's presence to His people.

We are blessed to have a permanent "tent" on the corner of S. Dayton St. and Kennewick Avenue, and still we have a responsibility to reflect the light of Jesus Christ to each other and the community. I love the term "mess" to describe me as a Christian. I am most definitely a work in progress! My learning curve is sometimes steep, and I can often get in the way of God's good direction. While I often make a mess of things, I am reminded by the Lord of the beauty of Grace and its covering, like a tent. What if we thought of church more like a "mess tent" where the imperfect, messed up, flawed humans gather together in communion, to be fed by the Holy One in His tabernacle? I am a messed up, beloved child of God, and yes, I can be both at the same time . . . and I am! The Lord loves me anyway, I am redeemed and blessed. I come to the table on Sunday, face to face with others, and together we return thanks by singing, hearing scripture, and praying.

No matter where you are on the journey, I pray you find your way into the "mess tent" where you experience the love of God with folks who are also on the transformative road that leads to life eternal.



Message from your Lay Leader

I was not good at prayer. I was one of those people who thought prayer was hard, that there was a method or rules on how to pray in order for it to be good. And then I read Max Lucado's book "Before Amen – The Power of a Simple Prayer."

Now, I pray all the time. God does not get tired of my incessant chattering like my husband does. Finally, a man who will listen to me all the time! Although I am still nervous about praying out loud in public on an impromptu basis, I will do it if I write out the prayer beforehand. Prayer is easy and should be just like having a conversation with God instead of like a regimented speech with a list of requests.

I also used to be like a deer in the headlights when asked to be a witness. I thought that meant going door to door and talking to the residents about God and the afterlife or standing on the street corner talking through a megaphone and holding a sign saying "Repent now, the end is near." Although I believed in God, I was afraid to talk about Him to others.

When I first joined this church, Pastor Jerry Poole asked me what my gifts were, what could I do to for the church. Oh boy, did I panic. I thought he was asking me to go door to door. He just smiled at my look of panic and asked me what I liked to do, what was I good at. I told him I liked to cook, so he told me to check out Soul Soup.
