Over 20 years ago, our Sr UMY, in partnership with 3 other Methodist youth groups from the Pacific NW, filled a 54-passenger van and drove 24 hours (without stopping for the night) to San Diego where we crossed the border into Mexico. Though it was hot, our accommodations rough, and our goal daunting, it was an incredible trip! Our goal was to build a home in just one week for a family in need and we did! Of course, the building codes in Mexico are much more lenient than we have in the United States (I'm thankful for codes that keep us safe). I remember with such fondness how the 4 youth groups came together as one and the power of our voices unified in song as we worshipped together each morning and night. Leaders and teens became dear friends, as we taught, mentored, and worked beside each other during the week (I am still connected with many of the adults . . . and the then-teens who were on that trip).

In the past 33 years, Kennewick First youth directors, including me, have planned numerous mission trips, Middler trips, ski trips, retreats, and camps. I've learned that while it's important to be an organized leader with an itinerary and goals set with God's guidance, it may be just as important to yield to God and recognize God's redirection. As well as we prepared each time, I doubt there was one trip or activity that went exactly as planned. On that first trip to Mexico, we had to adjust when materials didn't show up as expected, the old generator we needed seemed to run on prayer (and lots of it!), the temperatures were over 100 °F every day, and the ladies sleeping room was ransacked and our clothing stolen. When things don't go according to plan, we can be left feeling really uncomfortable, but the Holy One is able to re-orchestrate the plans we make, and He is always faithful. We follow Him.

Like that long-ago mission trip to Mexico, this summer our mission team will be joining a larger group from Texas, and I look forward to moments our groups will be united for the glory of the Lord! Our plan is to rebuild homes that were damaged by Hurricane Ian in September, along with these friends we have not yet met. If we can help ready a home for a family that has been displaced, that will be wonderful . . . and with God's strength we will do our very best to help make that happen. Please pray for our 11-member team as we, along with our duffle bags, 2 guitars, a cajon, med bags, and Bibles, travel to Florida to answer the call to assist our neighbor, who just happens to be 3,000 miles away. May the Lord provide us with a cool breeze in the heat, shade for a water break, safe travel, patience beyond measure, good health (helped along with ibuprofen, Gatorade, and bandaids!) and an experience that excites others to go and do likewise!

Come glorify God together

Don't use summer as an excuse to skip church! By gathering in corporate worship, we obey God's command, become equipped for Christian living, and minister to our fellow pilgrims. Consider these tips for engaging in corporate worship.

Come ready to receive; then let that overflow fuel you for the days ahead. Come prepared to participate, knowing that worshiping together is a rehearsal for heaven. But most importantly? Katherine Parker is a Methodist missionary with the General Board of Global Ministries, working in community development in Nepal. Her mission includes:

- adolescent empowerment, including sexual reproductive health and rights, mental health, and menstrual hygiene
- dignity for migrant workers
- water sanitation and hygiene.

Katherine is passionate about the process of linking values to action. In Nepal since 2013, Katherine first served in Cambodia. She has been a missionary since 2007. Out of college in 2000, she became a mission intern for three years with the Asian Rural Institute in Japan and Practical Farmers of Iowa.

From California, Katherine attended Harvey Mudd College in Claremont, where she graduated with a Bachelor of Science degree in biology. Her Master of Science degree, also in biology, was from California State University in Sacramento. Her graduate thesis was on bacterial contamination of drinking water in rural Ghana.

Katherine's home church is Mt. Tamalpais United Methodist Church in Mill Valley, CA. A long-time UWF member, she organized many mission trips. Our UWF unit is delighted to welcome all to meet and discuss missions with Katherine.

Message from your Lay Leader

I recently had surgery on my left shoulder. I had to wear a sling for six weeks. This is the first surgery that I have had where I temporarily lost the use of one of my limbs.

Although I knew why I needed to wear the sling, I did not like it. I couldn't wait for the six weeks to come to an end. I now have a much better appreciation for the ability to perform daily duties without being at a disadvantage. And it wasn't just daily duties that were difficult. It was also movement and function, such as balance, sleeping, and sitting.

Since getting rid of the sling, I have discovered that my shoulder hurts more. I now appreciate the function of the sling to protect and support my shoulder. The sling was a very important and vital part of my healing and a successful recovery.

I have a dear friend who suffers from severe rheumatoid arthritis, and as a result, she has had 28 surgeries and has been in and out of wheelchairs. Yet she has always been positive and hopeful throughout. I asked her one day long ago how she coped and stayed positive. Without hesitation, she answered "my faith in God – I know He will take care of me." It was just that simple. I didn't understand it at the time, but I certainly do now. By the way, she is the friend who introduced me to Max Lucado books and gave me the gift of his book "Anxious for Nothing," which impacted me tremendously.

- Enlist, interview, evaluate, review, and recommend candidates for service

However, it made me think about how expensive it must be to send 11 people to Florida on this mission trip!

Then I remembered the tremendous success of the Sr High UMY Dessert Auction. Cynthia informed me that she had several fundraising projects planned to support this mission and that she was hoping the Dessert Auction would raise around \$10,000. Praise God that they actually ended up raising over \$23,000 in just 1½ hours! Additional fundraising projects were not needed after all! They successfully raised enough money to fund this very important mission trip.

I know Cynthia worked very hard in organizing this fundraiser for the Sr High UMY. She made many, many phone calls to local merchants soliciting donation items for auction. The Sr High UMY members also made calls and visits to local merchants soliciting donations. Cynthia recruited church members to host tables, leaving the responsibility to fill the 8 chairs at each table to the host. There were 15 tables total. The first 7 tables were hosted by the parents of the teens going on the mission.

Others that helped with this event were Starlite Buchholz, Sharon Varzendah, and the amazing UMY Leadership team, including Jeff Varzendah, who made copious amounts of coffee! The youth were on hand to "wait on" tables.

Guests at each table pooled their money, placed it in an envelope, then submitted them up front to be ranked from the highest amount to the lowest. The highest ranked table got to choose a dessert first for their table to enjoy, and so on until each table had a dessert to enjoy. Then, any desserts left over were donated at the end of the afternoon. Many church members made or purchased the desserts.

A silent auction was coordinated during the event by Jim and Merrianne Door, and then two worthy items were presented in a live auction: 1) Dinner for six at Tagaris Taverna, compliments of Kristine Tagaris, and 2) a two-night stay at Pinecrest Lake House at Twin Lake, courtesy of Twinlow Camp.
