Look Alive Out There!

Have you ever watched a little league game? Young players without much experience are trying to remember what to do and how to do it. And while they have coaches, their parents tend to coach from the bleachers, too. It's got to be so confusing for the young ball player with so many different instructions being hurled at them. I remember attending many little league ball games and

hearing parents shout out "LOOK ALIVE OUT THERE!" - in fact, I have heard coaches bark this out as well. Of course, this well-meaning encouragement was intended to "perk" the team up, and maybe it did for a brief time, but was it ultimately helpful? I don't know.

In life, we are hit with a barrage of instruction and information from all different directions, and it can be confusing and overpowering. Who do we listen to, who is correct, what if I do the wrong thing, or worse yet, can I discern the truth? The number and volume of opinions, directions, and information is crushing, and in the midst of it all, we are supposed to "LOOK ALIVE OUT THERE." My life is in Christ, but if I want to look alive in Christ, I need to be able to listen to what God wants me to hear! If all we can hear is what others tell us to be and do, then we run the risk of losing ourselves and who the Lord created us to be.

If you ever feel overwhelmed with the constant, loud volume of this world, remember that YOU control the dial. You can change the channel, turn it down, or turn it off. You can put your phone down. You can choose to open your Bible and read, listen to Christian music or hymns, attend worship or a study, and spend time in quiet prayer.

May the one who saved you by Grace out of His great love for you, remind you how to tune into His voice and help you navigate the truth...for He is your ultimate coach!

We continue to serve 50 - 70 meals each week. The heat is particularly hard on those living on the street. In addition, we continue to make sack lunches available through the church office. We give about 40 lunches away each month and have done so for years.

The bread and desserts we receive from Panera have decreased in volume due to changes in their practices and we are occasionally short of desserts. We can always use cookies – you can drop them off on Thursday or bring them to church on Sunday and we can pop them into the freezer.
