Today, some worshipers wipe off the ashes before leaving church, to symbolize being cleansed from sin by Jesus' death; others wear the ashes the rest of the day, carrying the cross of Christ into the world. Reciting Genesis 3:19 often accompanies the placement of ashes: "You are dust, and to dust you shall return."

We just learned that one of our long-time guests, Linda, passed away. She and her adult son had been homeless for a few months and then got housing in a motel. They cared for one another and it is not likely her son will be able to live by himself. This has had an impact on all those who knew Linda, including our volunteers.

Even though she had no idea how to go about being a care provider, after much research and practice, she was one of the best that I have been around! Her grandmother lived a beautiful life until her final day and was able to stay in her home, mainly because of the loving choices the granddaughter made. In another case, I know a son who flies into town about every three weeks to spend a couple of weeks with his lovely mother, making sure she is doing well, before flying back home again.

Love can sound like hymns being sung around the bed as a mother passes onto life eternal. Love is a great-grandfather holding the hand of his 4-month-old great-grandson singing songs and playing, knowing his final days are coming. Love can look like a tired spouse doing everything possible to make her Valentine comfortable and peaceful as the end of their 54-year journey together draws to a close. Love is two sons reverently planning a memorial service to honor their mother. Love is visiting the sick, feeding the hungry, sitting with the dying, caring for children . . . love is moving toward those in need of care and providing that care.

Love cannot remain by itself - it has no meaning. Love has to be put into action and that action is service.

MESSAGE FROM YOUR LAY LEADER

I recently finished reading Max Lucado's book "It's Not About Me." As I have aged and learned some life lessons, this book really struck a chord with me and brought back memories from my childhood upbringing.

Max reminds us that it's not about us, it's all about God, and through this belief we can truly live an unburdened, happy life. We thought self-celebration would make us happy, but, instead, it has created financial difficulties, stressful careers, and strained relationships.

As a youth, I wanted everything my friends had . . . nice car, nice clothes, etc. You get the picture. But my family was not wealthy. My father was a blue-collar worker, sometimes working 7 days a week to make sure we had enough to pay the bills. He always told me, though, that he would make sure I always had what I needed, not always what I wanted. Although I understood what he was telling me, I didn't like it at that time. His motto was "if you can't afford to pay cash for something, then you really don't need it." My dad is now 87 and has never had a credit card.

People can get caught up with being the best, having the best, keeping up with the Joneses, showing off their possessions, one -upping their best friend or sibling, and the list goes on and on. Now, if you have the resources to buy lots of things that you want, that is okay and not a sin. It's how you use those possessions that can get you into trouble. You should use your resources and possessions to the glory of God, not to glorify yourself to others with how much you have. Money does not buy happiness, and the grass is not always greener on the other side.

Sheryl Crow's song "Soak Up the Sun" contains the lyrics "It's not having what you want, it's wanting what you've got."

These are good words to live by. If we are always trying to get what we can't attain or afford, we will never be happy and satisfied.
