**SOUL SOUP UPDATE**—We continue to serve 65 to 80 meals each week. There are at least one or two new guests each week, and there are a couple of families with children who are coming

regularly. The families are no surprise as food costs continue to remain high, and some forms of support for the poor are being pulled back. Some of our guests have attended Sunday service the past few weeks, and follow up conversations with them suggest that they felt welcomed (and were surprised by that) and enjoyed the worship experience. It is a blessing that we have a congregation willing to accept God's children as they come. Carol Allenbaugh continues to serve a Sunday meal and we help by doing the food prep the 3rd Sunday of each month. She serves about 120 meals often at multiple locations. In addition, she coordinates a shower trailer at least one Saturday a month.

It is rumored, but not yet confirmed, that one of our guests, Conrad, had a heart attack and died. No one has seen him in weeks but homelessness creates a real sense of anonymity that makes confirmation of these types of rumors difficult.

You have the opportunity to help enhance our worship experience on Sundays by providing altar decor. You may choose to honor a



#### **Observations:**

Congregation giving is generally running under expectations. Staff and Leaders are trying to cut back on budgeted expenses. The coming summer months are historically unfavorable financially. We appreciate KFUMC members continuing financial support during the summer.



### Don't be root-bound

As a new gardener, Jan Riggenbach used to treat bedding plants with extreme care, setting them into soil without disturbing the roots. Eventually she learned that rough — even ruthless — treatment is better in the long run.

"If the plant has been growing in its pot so long that the roots are circling the bottom, I jab my finger into the bottom of the soil and pull down to untangle the roots," Riggenbach wrote in her gardening column. "If the whole pot is filled with circling roots, I have to be merciless. I don't worry if I break some of the roots. That's better than allowing the roots to continue to circle when the plants are growing in the garden."

In the same way, it's easy to grow complacent and inward-focused in our walk with God. But bunched-up roots can't reach out for sustenance. So for maximum faith growth, dare to let God shake you up from time to time!

Your Facilities and Leadership Council

Ministry Teams want to give you an update on where we are in the process of the sewer repair and rerouting project.

While it appears that nothing is happening, a lot has been going on behind the scenes. Dave Miller and your Facilities Ministry Team have been meeting regularly with the architect. There have been multiple changes to the original plans, as variations in our aging building have surfaced. We have had hazardous materials testing done for asbestos and lead paint, and those resulting concerns are being addressed. The downstairs bathroom will probably be decommissioned next week for further testing. All this testing is required by the city before any permits can be issued. We have split the project into three phases to lighten the financial burden at each phase. Phase I will be repairing and rerouting the damaged sewer line, which includes closing off the downstairs women's bathroom under the former front entrance; Phase II will most likely be the Plaza beautification; and Phase III would then be installing new bathrooms and showers in the downstairs Classroom 3.

Revised drawings and plans should be done and submitted to the city within a couple of weeks, and hopefully they will be approved quickly so that we can get permits issued. Once permits are in hand, we can submit to contractors for bids. It may be a while before we see any actual construction being done, but we are definitely moving forward.

We will update you all periodically as we make our way through the various stages of this project. Thank you all for your support, patience, and prayers.
