One of the great things about visiting a new place is the great array of new things to discover. Moving is even better, because some of the best discoveries take time to notice and appreciate. I

enjoy discovering this part of Washington.

I love the winds in Kennewick; my cats are not as impressed. I've always enjoyed the wind. In Western New York State, south of Niagara Falls and Buffalo, the autumn winds were perfect for Halloween as they blew swirling clouds of dried leaves in the air and sent them scuttling like squirrels down the sidewalks. Ocean beach winds so consistently blow inland that one wonders how the waves can ever pull back! Here, in the Tri-Cities, the winds are gusty, whipping tree branches, rolling tumbleweed, and stirring up dust devils.

There are scientific explanations for how winds are formed, what influences their speed and direction, etc. The more scientists study the winds, the more accurate their weather forecasts are. Still, we are often surprised by the winds, and we alternate between welcoming the refreshing breezes and fearing the damages of stronger gales.

Do you remember the night Nicodemus snuck out to talk with Jesus and they talked about being born again? Nicodemus thought he had questions before this conversation! Now he's as confused as ever. How can one be born again? If it is so desirable, so essential, how can we make it happen?

Jesus says <u>we</u> can't make it happen. The one who makes new birth happen is God's Spirit. Jesus compared God's Holy Spirit with the wind when he said: "the wind blows where it chooses, and you hear the sound of it, but you do not know where it comes from or where it goes. So it is with everyone who is born of the Spirit." (John 3:8). In other words, no human can control or manipulate the Holy Spirit.

We might not be able to direct God's Spirit, but we can put ourselves in the Spirit's path and see what happens, go where it wants to send us, hear what it wants to say to us, and attend to how it touches us.

So, next time you see tree branches whipping in the wind, or feel a breeze, let it remind you that God's Spirit is also out and about in the world, ready to shape, guide, or fill you with divine life. Lean into it, trusting God is in it with you.

2024 PACIFIC NORTHWEST ANNUAL CONFERENCE REPORT

The 151st session of the Pacific Northwest Annual Conference was held in a hybrid format on June 13-16, 2024, at Central Church in Richland, Washington, with its Clergy Session (May 29) and legislative Focus Sessions (June 7,8) preceding online. Bishop Cedrick D. Bridgeforth of the Greater Northwest Episcopal Area presided.

During the <u>opening worship</u>, Bishop Bridgeforth read an apology to the victims of sexual misconduct in the church, recently approved at General Conference, which included a promise from the Church to educate leaders, provide healing resources, and develop a trauma-informed response. A lovely service of music, liturgy, and Holy Communion encapsulated this apology and the bishop's sermon that followed.

The bishop also delivered an enlivening sermon introducing the conference theme, "Being Well," based on John 4:4-17, to members. In his message, Bridgeforth spoke pastorally, "Beloveds, our theme is 'Being Well;' it is about us taking a pause, looking for those spaces and places where we can care for ourselves and those around us ... We want to check in on ourselves, and each other. We've been through a hard time."

Encouraging members to continue their work on the M.I.L.E., Bridgeforth humorously contrasted 'good' and 'bad' Methodists, noting that 'bad' Methodists were taking risks and not waiting for permission. He encouraged 'good' Methodists to look outside the window, look for a need, and then "open the door and step outside."

The bishop also challenged members to create spaces and opportunities for people to exhale, let go, name their needs, repent, and bring about repair. Considering the historic progress of the recently concluded General Conference, he said we must continue to work to change hearts and minds as "all we did was just change the words on a page... It's important. But that's not the work; that just opens the opportunity for the work to get done."

- 8 cups flour
- 1 cup baby oil



What you do:

- Measure flour into the large bowl.

- 2. Mix thoroughly until all the oil is combined and the texture is consistent. If needed, use your hands to knead the mixture.
- 3. The sand is ready when it sticks together to form a ball when pressed in your hands.
- 4. Use sand toys and molds to create a sandcastle. Store sand in an airtight container for up to two weeks.
