Extravagant Generosity

The recent worship series of Extravagant Generosity had a very profound effect on both Cory and me. We had discussions after each weekly letter was received about how we spend, how we prioritize, and how we give. We went as far as creating an Excel personal budget, something we haven't done for quite some time. Once the budget was completed, we could easily see where we could improve our spending habits.

Also, during this four-week series, God was nudging me to learn more about John Wesley and our church. Little did I know just how relevant this was to Pastor Shirley's worship series! I checked out two books on John Wesley from our library (*3 Simple Rules* and John Wesley's *Message Today*), borrowed The Other Phyllis's *A Century of Faith 1902-2002* book on our church, and then re-read Max Lucado's book titled *It's Not About Me*. Cory then read the books after me. We were surprised by how Wesley's teachings are still relevant today.

In his *Message Today*, Wesley addresses the use of money. He encourages us to: 1) Gain all that you can; 2) Save all that you can; and 3) Give all that you can. In gaining all that you can, we are to do so without harming ourselves or others. To save all that you can, we are to spend responsibly, not paying more than what something is worth, or buying things we don't need. To give all that we can, we are to keep just what we need to take care of ourselves and our family, then give the rest "to do good unto all men," giving to the poor, needy, and sick.

Max Lucado states in his book, *It's Not About Me*, that all that we have is from God, so we should give all that we have to the glory of God. We are not to use our wealth to show off or to raise ourselves above others. We all have heard the phrase "keeping up with the Joneses," and we all probably know someone who lives that way. Don't fall into the trap of spending more than you have on things that you don't need to impress people you don't even know.

After reading our church's centennial history book, we were both so humbled by the faith and actions of prior members. What an amazing history our church has. I encourage you all to reread your copy, if you have it. I don't know if a copy is in our library for you to check out, but I do have a photocopy of the book if anyone is interested in reading it or getting their own photocopy. Please let me know. In our history, the church survived through WW1, The Great Depression, and WW2 through the hard work and dedication of its members. One member even leveraged his farm to pay one of the mortgages on the church so that they didn't lose the church. Now *that* is extravagant generosity!

Some time ago, the church's purpose statement was "Fostering Generation of Christ's Disciples." Our church is comprised today, in part, of four, five, even six generations. To honor our former members, do we not have the responsibility to continue this legacy for future generations to come? Both Cory and I were so moved by our founding members' and subsequent generations' dedication to this church, that we have decided to add a bequeathment in our wills for KFUMC.

We are truly blessed by all that God has given us, and we are committed to give all that we can to the glory of God.

UPDATE FROM YOUR LEADERSHIP COUNCIL

NOVEMBER 19, 2024

Greetings brothers and sisters in Christ. I wanted to update you all on a couple of items.

First, the HVAC unit was replaced for the Susanna Wesley Room on Friday, November 15. Yay, that room is warm and cozy again! The cost of the new unit was approximately \$18,000.

Second, the estimated start date for the sewer line repair and rerouting is Monday, December 2, 2024, and the contractor estimates work will be completed on Monday, December 9, 2024. As a result, the front courtyard and steps will be completely blocked during this time. Also, please be prepared for extra truck traffic and noise during this week of construction, and plan accordingly for any activities at the church.

While a group of us were raking leaves and pruning bushes at church last Saturday, it was exciting to see the painted lines across the front plaza showing where the contractor will be tearing up the concrete to reroute the sewer line. Finally! After all this time, we are seeing signs that the project is finally on its way.
