The Buy-a-Brick Fundraising Campaign continues! This campaign will help

offset the cost of the church beautification project.

The Buy-a-Brick committee members will have a paver campaign day on Youth Sunday, May 18, where you may place your order for an engraved paver (brick) to be permanently installed in the Kennewick First UMC courtyard. Following this event, your next opportunity at an in-person campaign event will be in September! However, you will still be able to order a brick through the office during office hours, and forms are available in the entryway and on the website. You may pay with cash or check, through PushPay, or by credit card.

You are invited to purchase a paver to commemorate someone — a living or deceased family member or friend, or even yourself! The bricks are all one size with the same font (lettering). There are assorted icons that can be added to mark an event such as baptism, wedding, or membership date, etc., for an extra fee. The cost of each 6 by 12-inch paver is \$200; an icon is an additional \$25. The pavers will be laid in 2026, but the campaign is beginning now to help raise the funds needed to start the front courtyard project.

Funds raised will be used for both the church beautification project and future facilities projects. This project will add to the beauty of our neighborhood and will help those who see and enter our building feel the holy presence of God.

We bring our building, our place in the community, and our volunteers. They bring experience, networks, and money. Together we will support our neighbors in need through educational and economic development.

#### **Summer Camps**

Beginning July 14, Monday – Thursday mornings at KFUMC, we will host three weeks of Summer Camps for children, Middle School, or Elementary School, depending on the type of camp.

Since food-insecurity in our neighborhood is high, KFUMC will provide a substantial and healthy snack. The teaching will be done by young-adult missionaries hired by TCCC. The program will be supported by KFUMC volunteers.

Check your calendar and save your mornings in July. The details are still being finalized, and when they are, we will put out the call for volunteers. Background checks are required for volunteers.

#### Sewing Center

The double classroom on the balcony overlooking Ida Payne Hall is being prepared for the sewing machines and cutting tables to move in. The first class will begin in September. The class schedule will include two 5-week sessions per quarter, Fall-Winter-Spring. Classes will happen on Saturdays, with open sewing time scheduled during the week.

Eventually the classes will be taught by community members in the languages of the students. The first class might be taught by one of our own volunteers in English to members of our church — whatever it takes to get us started. Later teachers will be hired through grants acquired by TCCC. Registration for the classes will be required and limited to the space and machines at hand.

The Soul Soup account, managed by KFUMC for all the participating ministries, is declining rapidly. In concert with the Kennewick Kiwanis Foundation, we have



Friday Afternoon, August 15 – Sunday, August 17, at Noon



Make these sweet sandwiches for a Mother's Day tea party.

#### What you need:

- 4 oz. cream cheese, softened
- 1 cup heavy cream
- 3 Tablespoons powdered sugar
- 1 teaspoon lemon juice
- 6-10 strawberries, washed and sliced
- 6 slices of white bread
- Cellophane
- Adult help

#### What you do:

- With an electric mixer, whip the cream cheese in a bowl until fluffy.
- Add cream, powdered sugar, and lemon juice. Continue whipping on high speed until mixture is stiff.
- On each slice of bread, spread a layer of the mixture. Then arrange some sliced strawberries on top.
- Place the sandwiches together, with filling on the inside.
- Wrap tightly in cellophane. Chill for two hours so the filling sets.
- Trim off crusts with a serrated knife.
   Cut sandwiches in squares or triangles.

#### Seizing holy opportunities

In Holy Moments, Matthew Kelly discusses the world's need for more small (but sometimes large) instances of people caring for others, cultivating joy, encouragement and love instead of anger, envy, fear. Kelly defines a Holy Moment as "a single moment in which you open yourself to God. ... You set aside personal preference and self-interest, and for one moment you do what you prayerfully believe God is telling you to do."

This may mean mowing the lawn for a neighbor with a broken leg, praising a child on his artwork, buying a surprise snack for someone having a bad day, working extra shifts for a coworker with cancer so she can receive her full salary while out sick, paying for the next car's drive-thru order. Anyone can create a Holy Moment, because you don't need special skills, position or wealth. "If you want to see miracles, make yourself available to God," Kelly suggests.

He adds that God has a track record of collaborating with "the most unlikely people to make amazing things happen, and now He wants to collaborate with you." When we're open to God's leading, holy opportunities abound. And we will experience as much joy as the ones to whom we show care.
